- Relevance and institutionalizing of early warning systems audit tool kit by the National Disaster Management Organization of Vietnam, Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Philippines
- Consolidate the experiences and lesson learnt from the project and discuss way forward to strengthen End-to-End Early Warning Systems in the region

# REGIONAL EXPERIENCE SHARING WORKSHOP ON EARLY WARNING SYSTEMS

Supported under facilitating the integration of tsunami warning by strengthening multi-hazard warning systems in Sri Lanka, Vietnam, Indonesia and the Philippines

Bangkok, Thailand 20-21 December 2010 Since the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, countries in the region have made significant progress in establishing tsunami warning systems. Yet, gaps remain to make the system end-to-end to ensure that all high risk communities are connected to the warning system and are prepared to take action to reduce risks while having a multi-hazard approach. To complement various early warning systems initiatives in the region the Asian Disaster Preparedness Center (ADPC), with support from the American Red Cross (ARC) has been implementing a regional project "Facilitating the integration of tsunami warning by strengthening multi-hazard warning systems in Sri Lanka, Vietnam, Indonesia

and the Philippines" since July 2008. The regional project complements the various past and ongoing initiatives to strengthen early warning systems in the project countries by:



- a) Improving interagency collaboration
  and coordination
  among early
  warning information
  providers and its users through stakeholder forums
- b) Linking mass-based organizations, such as National Red Cross Societies (NRCS), to the national and local level early warning systems for synergy of programs and projects
- c) Building institutional capacities in utilizing hazard risk information for contingency planning and targeted emergency response
- Periodic early warning system audits to ensure effective and efficient system functionality and reliability
- Ensuring community connectivity, and emergency preparedness and readiness

In collaboration with the National Early Warning Agencies, National Disaster Management Organizations and the National Red Cross Societies of the target countries the project has facilitated the establishment and conduct of regular early warning stakeholders forum

(Monsoon Forum in Indonesia and Sri Lanka and Seasonal Climate Forum in Vietnam), supported the development of country specific training manual on End-to-End Early Warning and adaptation and pilot testing of Hazard Ready Community tool kit for periodic audit on community preparedness in the project countries. While the current phase of the project is nearing its completion it has been proposed to organize a regional experience sharing workshop of project partners to share the lessons and experiences of the project.

# **Objectives:**

- 1. To share experiences and lessons learnt from the key components of the project;
- 2. To share practices and experiences of NRCS of project countries on the use of early warning information for effective response;
