HFA Priorities for Action 4 & 5

Result 1- The establishment of DRR information delivery mechanisms for children with disabilities outside of school.

- 1.1 Socialisation and coordination with Government, cadres and DPOs (Disabled People's Organisations)
- 1.2 Establishment of operational information delivery system
- 1.3 Monitoring and project review with Government
- 1.4 Formalisation of the information delivery system

Result 2- Ensure the DRR information delivery mechanism established under Result 1 is operational.

- 2.1 Reproduction of existing ASB DRR materials for children with disabilities to be distributed to TKSK and FKPSM (sub-district level cadres), DPOs and at the village level for PSM (village level cadres / social workers)
- 2.2 Training of trainers Level 1 (ASB to TKSK/FKPSM/DPOs)
- 2.3 Training of trainers Level 2 (TKSK/FKPSM/DPOs to PSM)
- 2.4 Production of practical trainers' handbook for trainers on how to conduct community based trainings on DRR for children with disabilities

Result 3- Children with disabilities outside of school, and their families and neighbours, are provided with practical DRR multi-hazard information.

- 3.1 PSM and DPOs conduct survey to identify children with disabilities outside of school, and their disability types, to verify government data (Supervised by TKSK/FKPSM and ASB)
- 3.2 Analysis of data from survey and final beneficiary identification (ASB and TKSK/FKPSM)
- 3.3 Community training schedule finalised based on verified data above and according to disability type and location (TKSK, PSM and DPOs with ASB)
- 3.4 PSM and DPOs provide trainings on DRR to children with disabilities and their families and neighbours. DPOs to focus on children with disabilities with acute communication difficulties (i.e. deaf children, children with autism or severe learning difficulties and hyperactive children).
- 3.5 Children with disabilities, their parents and neighbours conduct evacuation drill under supervision of PSM, DPOs and TKSK/FKPSM.

Links to previous outputs on DRR & CCA

DRR material and products to be utilised under this action are ASB DRR educational materials, including those for children with disabilities. Produced previously under the previous DIPECHO project and the German Ministry of Foreign Affairs supported actions.

The DIPECHO 7th Action Plan project links with previous outputs from the DIPECHO 6th Action Plan that provided DRR trainings and materials to inclusive schools in Yogyakarta. The project also builds on experience of providing DRR information on a large scale to primary and special needs schools as supported by the German Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Area of Intervention

The project will be implemented in 10 villages in 4 districts of NTT province as listed below:

- Sikka district villages of Reroroja and Nangahale
- Ende district villages of Paupanda and Tanjung
- Timur Tengah Selatan (TTS) district villages of Linammutu, Oekiu, Nakfunu and Noebesa
- Kupang district villages of Tolnaku and Nunkurus

July 2010 - October 2011

Components: capacity building and learning, risk assessment, mitigation, advocacy, mainstreaming disability, climate change awareness

Result 1 Strengthened capacities of communities and local institutions to cooperate on planning and action to mitigation hazard impact and prepare for disasters

- 1.1 At least one mitigation measure in each of the 10 project villages identified and implemented in Ende, Sikka, TTS and Kupang districts
- 1.2 Eight DRR groups obtain basic skills in disaster mitigation, contingency, first aid, including PWD in DRR in Ende, TTS and Kupang districts
- 1.3 350 community members and local government staff in eight villages collaborate on DRR integration in village annual planning and budgeting in Ende, TTS and Kupang districts
- 1.4 500 community members and local government staff in 10 villages are aware of district government development planning processes, DM and natural resource management policies
- 1.5 A functional and operating structure for DRR mitigation, contingency and development efforts is present in at least 2 districts

Result 2 Strengthened mechanisms in learning, cooperation, advocacy and dissemination among and between communities, and between communities, authorities and local partners

- 2.1 DRR forums have been established representing all community members, and district and provincial staff plan for re-enactment of the DM bill in 3 districts NTT province'
- 2.2 Multi-stakeholder DRR forums in 3 districts have disseminated information on DM bill re-enactment, mitigation and preparedness to 10 villages
- 2.3 Advocacy messages on disaster prevention in coastal zones, in areas at high risk from floods and landslides and DRR integration in village planning delivered by the District government to 300 provincial and district government officials, civil society and private sector representatives
- 2.4 Local stakeholders have produced and disseminated 3 films to advocate for disaster prevention in coastal zones, in areas at high risk from floods and landslides and to show community, NGO and local government collaboration in 4 districts in NTT
- 2.5 All 10 villages have participated in inter-village training and exchange learning's with different villages
- 2.6 Project management structure has been established and is functional to facilitate coordination between and among consortium partners and key stakeholders, including local government

Activities

Activity 1. Community Capacity building in DRR and preparedness planning

- 1.1 Eight Communities conduct a village-level hazard, vulnerability, capacity assessment
- 1.2 Train and community DRR groups in organizational management, financial, and fund raising

- **1.4** Train communities and local government representatives on first aid, the role of PWDs in DRR, mangrove rehabilitation, and provide necessary follow-up support

- 1.7 Identify and develop advocacy messages for presentation to district government

2.1 Encourage local governments to provide assistance to village DRR groups in implementation of DM Act, other DRR-related policies and in discussing critical DRR issues

- **2.2** Initiate and support development of district multi-stakeholder DRR platforms
- **2.3** Support the capacity building needs of district government DRR structures through training, research, and development of advocacy materials

- 3.1 Conduct inter-village follow up to training, exchange learning and documentation of good practice on DRR
- **3.2** Hold multi-district learning forums on DRR for coastal zone management, floods and landslides management and DRR integration, and identify and document good DRR practices

Activity 4. Joint advocacy and dissemination

- **4.1** Support local stakeholders in the joint production and dissemination of three films on coastal management, floods and landslides management
- **4.2** Support local stakeholders in awareness campaigns on functions and benefits of mangrove to support livelihoods and to mitigate disasters' impact
- **4.3** Facilitate and support a provincial meeting for presentation of advocacy agenda by district government and other key stakeholders

Enhancing Disaster Preparedness and Response Capacity in Garut District, West Java

Garut District, West Java, Indonesia

June 2010 - August 2011

Components: CBDRR- Community based disaster risk reduction; capacity-building, health component, community action plans.

Result 1: The capacity of local government bodies and communities to identify, assess and monitor disaster risks is enhanced and their disaster preparedness increased

- 1.1 Assist governments to develop/update their hazard mapping, risk assessments, emergency response SOPs and DRR action plans
- 1.2 Work with local governments, IOM's implementing partner and PMI to socialise the emergency response SOPs and DRR action plans and conduct simulations
- 1.3 Provide technical support to government officials to develop/enhance their disaster data and information management system as well as to improve their capacity to collect and disaggregate data to identify vulnerabilities
- 1.4 Encourage government officials to feed the disaggregated data into the existing Indonesian Disaster Data and Information database (DIBI) and to relevant authorities including BNPB

Result 2: The capacity of health facilities, health staff and communities to prepare for and rapidly respond to natural disasters is enhanced.

- 2.1 Liaise with PMI and DHO to conduct a ToT on first aid for Task Force members
- 2.2 Facilitate the First Aid Trainers and PMI to conduct basic first aid training for community members
- 2.3 Coordinate with the International Training Consortium for DRR (ITC-DRR), WHO, PMI, and DHO and work with the service provider to conduct BTLS training, incorporating multi-hazard disaster preparedness training for health staff
- 2.4 Procure and distribute first aid kits to ToT participants as well as PMI for further distribution to community members
- 2.5 Encourage and facilitate health staff to conduct more DRR-related health education initiatives, including on water and sanitation, hygiene, environmental health and waste management, and provide outreach to vulnerable citizens
- 2.6 Engage Technical Trainers to work with IOM and its local implementing partner to conduct trainings for health staff on preparing their health facilities for natural disasters
- 2.7 Revise, print and distribute Modul Pelatihan 2009 2010 for the health sector

Result 3: Coordination and information exchange between key DRR stakeholders is strengthened.

- 3.1 Coordinate with village governments and community groups to establish Village Disaster Management Team
- 3.2 Consolidate existing publications to develop IEC materials on multi-sectoral DRR including health and distribute them to simulation and training participants, Village Disaster Management Team members and attendees of awareness raising events
- 3.3 Coordinate with Garut DRR forum members to organise DRR day at the district level
- 3.4 Liaise and coordinate with district and sub-district government officials as well Village Disaster Management Teams to conduct cross-visits
- 3.5 Using a combination of traditional folk media and modern media, conduct awareness raising initiatives, e.g. performances and radio shows
- 3.6 Participate in DIPECHO consultative meetings and other DRR coordination mechanisms to promote and advocate the protection of vulnerable citizens but also the link between DRR and health
- 3.7 Conduct a lessons learned/handover workshop involving all key stakeholders, including government agencies.

Links to previous outputs on DRR & CCA

- **Hazard maps and risk assessments.** The information on hazard maps and risk assessment need to be shared to the key stakeholders to ensure a thorough understanding of hazards and risks in the community
- The Disaster Management Team in each village. The Disaster Management Team will able to identify/clarify the chain of command and develop/update the DRR action plans and emergency responses SOPs
- DRR action plans and emergency responses SOPs. DRR action plans and emergency responses SOP developed in each village will be linked to the sub-district and disaster management frameworks.
- **Health Facility for Disasters.** The trainings on **Basic Life Trauma Support (BLTS)** and DRR-related health education initiatives will allow the health staff to prepare their health facilities for natural disasters.
- Basic health skills and how to administer first aid kits for each village. Basic first aid skills and first aid kits provided for task force members in each village will increase the capacity to response to disasters
- Cross-dissemination of information and lessons learned to enhance synergies and complementarities. Cross-dissemination of information will be held on regular basis not only to DIPECHO partners but also to DRR-related stakeholders for enhancing synergies and complementarities.
- **Cross visits.** Village Disaster Management Team as well as sub-districts and district government representatives will be invited on field visits to show to the participants ways to conduct DRR activities.
- **DRR day at the district level.** The DRR day organized at level district will enhance the collaboration among the DRR forum members, increase communication &information sharing.
- Radio talk shows. A series of radio talk shows to promote community awareness on disaster risk reduction activities

Indonesia: Province: West Sumatra; Districts: Padang City District and Agam District

1 July 2010 to 30 September 2011 Components: Capacity building, DRR, Government partnership

Objective

To increase resilience and reduce vulnerability in 8 local communities, 2 BPBD agencies, and 12 schools through strategies and capacity building that enable them to better prepare for, mitigate and respond to natural disasters.

Result 1: Eight communities have increased knowledge and skills to reduce their vulnerability through training and participatory planning. (Community)

- 1.1 Identification of target communities and establishment of community-level disaster preparedness teams (DPTs)
- 1.2 Capacity-building and training of DPTs
- 1.3 Facilitate vulnerability and capacity assessments, and the development and implementation of community emergency plans and evacuation routes.

Result 2: 40 DPT members proactively promote preparedness within and beyond their communities, and advocate to the government their preparedness needs

- 2.1 Training of trainers for DPTs
- 2.2 Link DPT trainers to District Disaster Management Agency

Result 3: Two district Disaster Management Agencies/BPBD have been trained and have developed Standard Operating Procedures and contingency plans per the Disaster Management Law Number 24, 2007 (Government)

- 3.1 Conduct training and workshops to build the institutional strength and DRR capacity in Disaster Management Agency/BPBD in each of the two target districts
- 3.2 Establish two district stakeholder consultative taskforces, one in each of the two target districts
- 3.3 District-wide vulnerability and capacity assessments
- 3.4 Advocacy workshops
- 3.5 Cross visits between BPBD
- 3.6 Work with the Disaster Management Agency (BPBD) to conduct a tabletop simulation

Result 4: Disaster Management Agencies/BPBD from 4 other districts in the province, and from the West Sumatra provincial Disaster Management Agency, learn about the P3DM approach to DRR through cross-learning

- 4.1 Organise provincial DRR learning and evaluation conference
- 4.2 Conduct DRR impact case study in one target area

Result 5: Twelve School Disaster Preparedness Teams (SDPTs) are established and trained in twelve schools in Padang City and Agam District

- 5.1 Establish and training of school disaster preparedness teams (SDPTs)
- 5.2 Development of emergency plans and evacuation routes, simulation and competitions

Links to previous outputs on DRR & CCA

P3DM: Mercy Corps has been working with communities in Padang Pariaman and Pesisir Selatan Districts since late 2008 as part of the P3DM programme, establishing Disaster Preparedness Teams (DPT), conducting training, and building links to government and private sector. A recent evaluation in P3DM communities found that during the 30 September earthquake, the DPT members were significantly more prepared than others in their communities; Mercy Corps (with local partner Kogami) is now focusing on building the capacity of DPT members to transfer their trainings and knowledge to others.

Planned products

Vulnerability and capacity assessment: With facilitation and support from Mercy Corps and partners, BPBD will coordinate a district-wide vulnerability and capacity mapping of Agam district through local actors (universities, communities, and government) and make the digital results openly available.

Government emergency simulation: Based on the lessons learnt, the BPBD along with district government officials from other agencies (such as education, public works, health, etc...), will take part in tabletop emergency simulations to practice and monitor the skills they have learned. The simulation will focus on coordination among agencies as well as preparedness for contingencies during an emergency response.

Provincial conference: A provincial DRR learning and evaluation conference will bring together Disaster Management Agency/BPBD staff and DPT representatives from the four districts Mercy Corps has targeted under the USAID P3DM and DIPECHO programmes, along with district officials from disaster agencies in other districts in West Sumatra and other DRR actors in the province. Enthusiasm generated through the learning and dialogue of the conference can be followed up through facilitation of BPBD cross-visits between the target districts and other districts.

School event: Based on the P3DM experience, Mercy Corps has found that school events, such as fun days, are a powerful tool for engaging with students and disseminating DRR messaging, and at least one such event will be held as part of this programme, involving students from all the 12 target schools.

Case study: Mercy Corps is planning to produce and publish a case study how this action supports the Hyogo Framework for Action. This will be distributed to stakeholders as well as other actors in the sector.

An external evaluation at the end of the programme will provide analysis of the extent to which anticipated programme results were actually achieved.

IEC materials: evacuation route billboards, posters, leaflets, brochures, district hazard maps.

Result1- In both countries, Key local stakeholders in Disaster Risk Management have increased their knowledge on disability and mainstreaming disability in DRM

- 1.1 With the participation of the local stakeholders, to adapt the existing training modules ("How to mainstream disability issues in CBDRM") and sensitization tools to the Indonesian and Philippines contexts and publish them.
- 1.2 To finish defining the target groups for trainings and evaluate their precise training needs to best adapt the training contents and methodologies, to formalize agreements.
- 1.3 To properly disseminate the information at local, and national levels.
- 1.4 To collect and publish best practices and lessons learnt in a participative way with the different partners; formalize them in a publication and to release the outputs through workshops at local and national levels.

Result 2- Support the integration of disaster risk management (DRM) in local governance and development

- 2.1 Support Provincial Disaster Management Office (PDMO) creation and capacity-building
- 2.2 Awareness-raising on DRR and its link to sustainable development of local chief executives, local development planners, and disaster managers at provincial, municipal, and barangay levels
- 2.3 Support and sustain Coordination Mechanisms in among and between DCCs at provincial, municipal, and Barangay levels
- 2.4 Awareness-raising and Trainings for the Media and Private/Business Sector
- 2.5 Support formulation, adoption, application and testing of Disaster Preparedness Plans at the Barangay level
- 2.6 Support for the integration, synchronization, and testing of School and Barangay Disaster Preparedness Plans including EWS

Result 3- In both countries, PWD are effectively integrated in the targeted areas' Community Based Disaster Risk Management activities

- 3.1 To conduct deep assessments to develop detailed and tailored training programs (schedule, content, selection of participants in the organizations...) and to formalize MOU
- 3.2 To implement appropriate training plans for each partners
- 3.3 To accompany and monitor the effective inclusion of persons with disabilities in the activities implemented by the partners who benefited from trainings.
- 3.4 To support the participation in the partners' activities of motivated persons with disabilities via the delivery of appropriate specific individual support (needs assessment, distribution of assistive devices, therapeutic care...).
- 3.5 To raise the targeted communities awareness on disability, specific needs and aptitudes of persons with disability and the need of mainstreaming them in DRR; to provide large information on the project activities and outputs.
- 3.6 To organize an inter-program exchange of practices and experiences in the Philippines, with

representatives of HI Philippines, HI Indonesia and representatives of the local organizations partners in the project.

Result 4- A task force of disability focused organisations is prepared 1/ to meet PWD's specific needs in case of a natural disaster (Philippines) and 2/ to do guidance on how to mainstream disability in disaster preparedness (Indonesia)

- 4.1 To evaluate and identify the staff to be trained (15 in Philippines, 9 in Indonesia).
- 4.2 To organise appropriate trainings for the task forces:
- 4.3 In Philippines, to pre-position emergency stocks within at least 2 organisations' premises including specific assistive devices for PwDs and elders and other extremely vulnerable with specific needs (bed ridden).
- 4.4 In Philippines, to document the lessons learnt and <u>elaborate a training module for including disability issues in disaster response</u>. In both countries, to largely inform all the stakeholders about these task forces through all appropriate means.
