Timeline: June 2010 - July 2011

Components: capacity-building, training, knowledge management on AADMER and CB-DRR, multi-stakeholder partnerships

Result1- Civil Society organizations working in Cambodia, Indonesia, Philippines and Vietnam have increased understanding of the links between national DRR policies and programmes and the AADMER Work Programme, and have more knowledge and skills on how to engage and participate in these.

- 1.1 Mapping of national and sub-national DRR stakeholders (or collating if already documented) and assessment of needs (knowledge, skills, coordination) for engagement with AADMER
- 1.2 Analysis of DRR policies and laws in relation to AADMER requirements
- 1.3 Production of ICE materials on AADMER: translation of AADMER materials into local languages, Braille, audio books
- 1.4 Regional seminar on AADMER priority projects and partnership modalities for APG members and organizations of or working with vulnerable groups
- 1.5 APG Members conduct national and community-level orientation seminars (either directly or by supporting other organizations already working with these communities) on AADMER priority projects and partnership modalities for vulnerable groups

Result 2- Shared understanding of models and processes for embedding or institutionalizing national and ASEAN-level multi-stakeholder partnership in the implementation of AADMER Work Programme priority projects

- 2.1 Mapping and analysis of existing practices and models of partnerships, how they work, strengths and weaknesses, capacities and resources

- 3.2 Workshop to elaborate on AADMER M & E partnership modality
- 3.3 Mapping of existing knowledge and/or trainings on CB-DRR, international standards and protocols for government DM/DRR agencies, and developing a Training Needs Analysis (TNA)
- 3.4 TNA, including multi-stakeholder partnerships and working with vulnerable groups
- 3.5 Design a training programme based on needs identified
- 3.6 ACDM and CSO forum on Year 1 implementation of AADMER (held jointly with 1.3 above)
